A BRIEF REPORT ON THE VISIT BY EVC DELEGATION TO GHANA

Introduction

On Saturday, October 30, 2021, a visiting team from Germany paid a working visit to Ghana to continue an on-going project on *Exploring Visual Cultures*. The team was made up of Ernst Wagner, Janina Baldhuber, Annette Schemmel, Tim Proetel and Georg Schatz.

Exploring Visual Cultures (EVC) is a joint transnational project run by universities, schools and art galleries/museums in different countries in Africa and Europe, coordinated by an Expert Panel from Germany, Ghana, South Africa, Kenya, and Cameroon. The panel consists of scholars in the field of art history, visual culture and cultural studies.

The project 'Exploring Visual Cultures' focusses on visual objects such as art-works, architecture, logos, photos, and fashion among others. It addresses questions on What visual objects mean, how they are influenced or how they influence, while attempting to looks for answers in global dialogues among artists, (art) educators, (art) historians, (cultural) anthropologists, and students. The discussions from multiple/diverse perspectives are shared with a worldwide community of researchers and educators through EVC website, conferences, and publications.

Exploring Visual Cultures (EVC) also pays attention to concepts of Shared Heritage, Education for Sustainable Development, and Global Citizenship Education (as defined by UNESCO). Thus, the project also looks at images and image practices through a broad inter- and transdisciplinary views within the framework of Education for Sustainable Development (ESD), asking questions about culture, heritage and our shared globalized future.

The EVC German Team in Ghana

The EVC German Team arrived in Accra, Ghana on Saturday 30th October 2021 to interact with their Ghanaian counterparts on the progress of the *Exploring Visual Cultures Project*. They were received by their Ghanaian partners at the Kotoka International Airport and lodged at Winneba in the Central Region of Ghana.

Studio Visits in Winneba township

The next day, the EVC Team (both German and Ghana's group) visited Theophilus Mensah, an art educator and a sculptor in his studio at Winneba where he introduced the team to some of his finished works, media, inspirations, commissions, what drives him to work and motivation to students. The visit was also designed to view works of visual cultures in public space. Most of his works were life size with a few heroic forms. They were all highly realistic with respect to the concepts that defined their execution. Theo works mainly in cement and fibre glass. He has works mounted in many parts of Winneba and these works project the culture of the people of Winneba. Figures 1,2, and 3 show examples of Theo's works in public space.

Visit to the Winneba Senior High School and Experimental teaching

The next day saw the EVC Team visiting one of the public senior high schools in Winneba – Winneba Senior High School. There was a short briefing led by Ernst Wagner on the direction of the interaction with the Visual Art students and art teachers in the school.





This was followed by an experimental teaching visual led by two of the members from the German Team, Annette and Tim. They taught the form one visual art students of the Winneba Senior High School from 10 am to 11:30am. Figures 2, 3, and 4 shows the EVC Team at the meeting.

The students were taken through a hands-on visual art lesson on image identification and development. Prior to this activity, they were presented with a painting by Goya, a Spanish painter, and were given the opportunity to explore, to develop concepts based on what they dreams about.

It was a wonderful presentation that caught the attention of the audience who advocated for the adoption of the proposed SCA image library by the University of Education, Winneba.

The next day witnessed a seminar presentation by post-graduate *sandwich* students reading art education at University of Education, Winneba. The topics presented span across diverse disciplines, from tourism to art-making to visual culture. There was another meeting with the Executives of the Art Teachers Association of Ghana (ATAG). The discussion focused on the objectives of the group and the interest expressed in taking part in an international art teaching competition initiated by a group from Germany.

Wednesday, November 3, 2021 saw the EVC team taking a tour to the Cape Coast Castle to see the dungeons and visual imagery of the slave trade in Sub-Saharan Africa. They received first hand information from a tour guide who traced the history of slavery from the Gold Coast to its abolition. The group then left for Kumasi after mid-day.

Visit to the blaxTARLINES – Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology, Kumasi

In Kumasi, they interacted with blaxTARLINES at Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology. blaxTARLINES is a group of artists and students who seek to project contemporary art/visual culture from multiple perspectives. On Thursday, November 4, there were a series of presentations on blaxTARLINES and affiliate collectives by Kwesi Ohene-Ayeh, Bernard Akoi-jackson and Alice Korkor Ebeheakey. Portfolio presentations were made by Adjo Kisser, Tracy Thompson, and Elolo Bokoso.

On Saturday morning, the team left Kumasi for Accra to interact with resident scholars at the Merian Institute for Advanced Studies in Africa (MIASA). The interaction focused on restitution – bringing back African artworks to Africa. As part of their project the scholars at the Institute were conducting a study in Kpando in the Volta region of Ghana to ascertain the original place/source of identified artworks. They interviewed chiefs and opinion leaders in the region under discussion. After a couple of hours of discussion, the EVC Team left for the Kotoka International Airport, Accra for departure to Germany.
